THE MASONIC CIRCLE

The Masonic Circle held its first meeting on Wednesday 10 July 2019. There were 24 participants in attendance from seven Lodges including three from the Lodge St. Andrew No. 1437 SC. The group comprised 3 installed Masters, 12 Master Masons, 4 Fellowcrafts, and 5 Entered Apprentices (see Appendix 1). Four of the participants also attended the Essential Facilitation Skills Workshop and helped facilitate the discussions.

What is the Masonic Circle?

The Masonic Circle, a facilitated Masonic study group, is a monthly collaborative learning sessions for Freemasons who want to improve their understanding of our rites and ceremonies. The purpose of the Masonic Circle is to:

- to stimulate our interest and understanding of Freemasonry,
- to foster the intellectual development of the Craft, and
- to promote masonic education and instruction through open discussion.

The meetings of The Masonic Circle are open to all Freemasons including Entered Apprentices

How does the Masonic Circle work?

At the Masonic Circle meetings, participants engage in actively learning by exploring important Masonic and philosophical concepts in our Ceremonies. The Masonic Circles is based on inquiry-based and collaborative learning; educational methods alluded to in the Ceremonies of Initiation and Passing. The form of learning helps the participants develop fresh perspectives and promote a better understanding of Freemasonry.

Why the Masonic Circle?

Research shows that students who attend facilitated study groups regularly gain a deeper understanding of the material. Facilitated study groups also offer the potential of fostering a sense of community. Research shows that over time, the participants increasingly engaged and interacted with peers; leading to a stronger sense of community and belonging that motivated individuals to look out for one another.

What does the Masonic Circle's programme offer?

At the inaugural meeting of the Masonic Circle, the participants discussed "What is Freemasonry?" and upcoming meetings the Circle will discuss:

In Year 1, the Masonic Circle will focus on the Entered Apprentice Degree. In Years 2 and three, the Masonic Circle will develop the syllabus for the Fellow Craft and Master Masons Degrees.

CONCLUSION

The Masonic Circle is intended to address membership attrition.

Research has shown that facilitated study groups have helped address attrition in many higher education institutions. Research has also shown that retention can be improved if students experience social and academic integration. Social and academic integration is often restricted to the classroom and often facilitated by teachers, an often limited resource. Facilitated peer learning in study groups, however, promotes academic and especially social integration outside the classroom without recourse to faculty resources.








